NOVEMBER MEETING

Jon Hall of A-1 Lanes spoke on the Bartley Collection finishing product lines. Jon has 16 years experience in wood working, including stints as a shop teacher, carpenter, shop foreman and his own business. Our thanks to Jon for a clear presentation, a special thank you to the Elks Lodge for hosting our meeting.

Bartley's is a combination of varnish and polyurethane. It won't raise grain. No need to sand between coats. The paste consistency is a wipe on, wipe off stain. It is very fast drying. which greatly reduces duet laying on the finish.

The multi-step process involves filter, then stain, then varnish. Apply filler with the appropriate color with a rag or foam brush, across the grain. Draw a scraper, buriap or rough cloth across the grain to remove excess. Then lightly buff with the grain. Let dry overnight. The filler can be sanded. On porous woods, two coats may be necessary. Filler on pine can reduce varnish coats later.

The stain is a wipe on, wipe off pasts. On woods like maple, oak and ash, don't sand more than 120 grit if staining. This will allow more stain to penetrate-making the finish more even.

inexpensive paper towels can be used to apply. The lint on cheap towels is minimal. Expensive paper products have lint to add bulk and absorbency. No lint cloth or even panty

hose will also work.
Stains can be deepened up to four coats. Additional colors, such as japan colors, artists oils or spoonfuls of other Bartley's stains can be mixed.

The clear varnish finishes the process. Use the clear to help seal end grain. Tack cloths can be made from dipping a lint free cloth lightly in the clear varnish.

Spray lacquer (not brushing laquer) will adhere over Bartley's. The varnish will also work over Danish oil. (Just be sure the stain is good and dry.)

One trick on intricate acroll work is to blow

the varnish into the fine cuts with low pressure

Always properly dispose of rage and application materials-to avoid spontaneous combustion.

Blade Sharpening—a good quality carbide blade can be resharpened about 20 times. You can clean your blades with a brass or bristle brush soaked in fantastic, oven cleaner or lacquer thinner to remove pitch. Some janitorial supplies have a very powerful cleaner that works well, but you must becareful not to

splash it on your hands. Our thanks to Van Williams from MVP sharpeners for the advice.

Zatis Murphy said he solved his 45 degree miter problem by using a power miter saw and a freud crosscut saw blade.(LUB5M).


