Problem:

What is the best method of cutting a taper on a long board?

Solution:

Draw a line on the board and cut to the line.

If you have more than one board and want them to be the same, make a carrier board with alignment pins and clamps.

Show and Tell:

Larry Barnes had the table saw miter jig for cutting edge banding to legnth and the gage for marking the corner for the miter cut. He buys his plastic from Woodworker's Supply and A-1 Plastics. He buys his T-nuts from Bruss and he says they are the best made. he used the suggestions in the last issue of "Fine Woodworking Magazine" to make the jig.

Lewis Vallette showed his segmented bowl and plate. The bowl was made from 192 pieces of cherry, maple and walnut. The plate had 25 segments. He cuts the pieces on a table saw, using a jig for the angles and glues them together in rings and then glues the rings together to make the bowl.

Chuck Maxwell showed why you need a centering pin to line your router up when doing inlays.

Guy Meaders showed his router bit cabinet made from plans in Woodsmith No. 105. He also showed his jig for cutting dovetail keys.

Luna Ford showed his green wood hollow vessel turnings. He said to be sure to wear a mask when turning chinese tallow. He had multi-centered turnings, lidded boxes and minitures. He uses a slow speed for sanding and sands against the rotation of the part. He starts with a 240 grit paper and works up to 600 grit. He finishes with a polishing compound.

Program:

Woodturning by Luna Ford

Luna Ford is one of the best known woodturners in Texas and has demonstrated all over the country.

He started his program by showing how to use a shearing technique with a skew. He recommends that beginners use a dead cup center for a driver. If you have a catch, your wood will stop instead of flying out of the lathe. He also showed how to properly use skews, scrapers and gouges.

As he demonstrated, he gave many helpful hints. When turning long grain, cut from the large diameter to the small diameter. When turning cross grain, turn from the small diameter to the large diameter. Always keep the bevel on the wood to keep from getting a catch. The proper RPM creates less heat on your tools.

Luna explained the proper way to grind your tools for different kinds of woods.

He then demonstrated the difference between shearing and scraping. He showed how to turn beads using skews and gouges. He showed the right way to turn small diameters using his finger as a backup. he says to keep the pressure to the tail stock or the head stock, not against the wood or it will break.

Luna gave a very interesting and informative program. He recommends tapes by Richard Raffin which we have in our library. I look forward to seeing Luna do another program.


All of the money raised through the sale and raffle of the toys you made was used during the Christmas season for families in need of such things as utility and rental assistance and holiday food.

BAYOU BEND COLLECTION AND GARDENS ACQUIRES IMPORTANT PIECES

Rare joined great chair among major additions to the collection

David Warren, director of Bayou Bend Collection and Gardens, announced the recent acquisition of more than 55 works of art. Acquisitions were made in many areas, including silver, paintings, glassware, furniture and range from as early as 1640 to as late as 1870.

"Bayou Bend is committed to providing an extensive collection of quality American decorative arts," Warren said. "These recent additions greatly enhance the renowned collection and extend Miss Ima Hogg's vision of Bayou Bend as a premiere American decorative arts center."

One of the most important acquisitions was a 17th-century joined great chair (c. 1640-1685), a very rare form of American furniture long sought by Miss Ima Hogg, who gave Bayou Bend to the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston in 1957. Made in coastal Massachusetts in Essex County, this chair is one of six surviving examples and represents the first in Bayou Bend's collection. The chair was produced by a joiner, a craftsman who makes furniture joined with mortise-and-tenon construction held together with pegs. The flat arcaded crest rail and interlocking semicircles with abstract leaf carving relate to the form and decorative vocabulary of furniture produced in the East Anglia section of England, from which many of the New England settlers came. The absence of any applied turned spindles or geometric moldings suggests that these chairs were made by the first generation of craftsmen trained in the earliest style of joined furniture produced in this country. The chair was a museum purchase with funds provided by Miss Ima Hogg, by exchange.
