Notes from The January Meeting

Program

Jim Schmidt from 3M showed us many new and some familiar products that are available. Interesting developments have occurred as far as the 'scotch-bite' technology for replacing steel wool. A 0000 version is promised. (I like them since they last longer than steel wool and don't have the rust prevention oil in them. - edt.) Some questions were raised about the new stripping products that are water-based. Those in WwCH are concerned about the fine antiques with delicate carvings. The water will raise the grain and the only suggestion was to sand. Not possible since it would destroy the carving. A new light weight disposable dust/vapor mask was shown. Many like the weight but questioned the practicality/price since the dust filters were replaceable but the charcoal filters were not. Hopefully Jim will take some of the ideas back to 3M. They seem to be heading the right direction. Thanks for the presentation and gift certificate, Jim.

WOODFIND Update

WwCH owns a copy of WOODFIND, a search program and database of woodworking periodical topics and that runs on a DOS based personal computer. Currently, Don Richardson operates it for the club and Zadis Murphy owns a copy that he will use to do searches for club members. Don announced at the January meeting that the database has been updated through 1994 and is available.

To use the service call Don or Zadis and ask about your particular topic. They will get back to you as soon as possible with the different references available. Don usually has his laptop computer at the monthly meetings.

On Safety

Leonard Elholm told of using 'quick grip' type clamps to hold a work piece to a fence on his router table. The task was to trim about 1/32 out of a dado. The bit caught the work piece and flung the piece off of the table. His finger tip ended in the router bit loosing part of his finger nail which is growing back. To date the medical bills are about \$500 so far. Please be careful and be sure that everything is held down.

Problems and Solutions

Walt Turpening asked about selecting rocker curvatures for different scales of rocking chairs. Steve Procter suggested in using a catenary curve. Another member suggested checking Thomas Moser's texts on American Furniture Designs.

Don Richardson had a solution looking for problems. In different supply catalogs 'Teflon' tape is being sold in 3/4 inch and 3 inch widths. He has used the 3/4 inch tape on drawer runners with excellent results. Are there any other applications? (I have used it on heavy file drawers in an old desk with wood-on-wood runners eliminated difficult retrofitting of mechanical runners. -edt)

Project Showcase

Dooley George showed his elegant solution to folding sawhorses. Two leg frames of cedar are hinged at the top with an ingenious folding stretcher. When the sawhorse is taken down from the wall a light flip and the stretcher unfolds to separate the legs. To close lift the sawhorse lightly kick the stretcher up and close the 'horse wit your hand. Good work, Dooley

Larry Barnes has been concerned about dust in his shop for some time. He started with a Delta 1 hp dust collector but found it inadequate. After reading an article in Fine Woodworking #100, he decided to build his own system. It uses a cyclone separator as stage one that dumps into a large plastic 'trash can' with stage two being a series of inverted dust filters that are used in commercial dust systems. The inverted filters are self cleaning in that when they have collected enough dust it falls naturally to the dust box. Actually the filters should not be cleaned since the dust that collects makes the filters better. He bought the filters from a supplier of commercial systems. The final system size is approximately 8 feet high, 5 feet wide and 2 feet deep and cost about \$400 to build. His shop has 10 feet ceilings. Larry's photos of the system show a very nice piece of work in a very nice shop.

Ken Wallis showed his latest creation, an entertainment center that houses a 35 inch TV with other electronic equipment. The cabinet is 5 1/2 feet high, about 8 feet long and 25 inches deep. Birch plywood is the main construction material (5 sheets worth) with maple from A-1 Lanes (naturally -edt). It is stained with Bartley's jet mahogai a coat of Bartley's varnish to even out the stain take-up by the birch plywood. Impressive, Ken.

Bob Pfiffner showed his working scale model of a 'South Pointing Compass'. The original was a two wheeled cart towed at the back of caravans crossing the Gobi desert. Simple toothed wooden gears operated on the differential principle to keep a carved figure pointing in the desired direction as the caravan wandered across the terrain. If the two wheels rotated exactly the same number of revolutions the figure did not change its pointing direction relative to the cart, but if the cart turned, even slightly, the figure would rotate towards the direction the caravan should be heading. It is an example of one of the earliest practical use of gears. He suggests making the wheels wider to increase the friction and ease of operation. Nice work, Bob.

Recommendations

Zadis Murphy reviewed 'Woodworking With A Router' published by Rodale Press. He found it an excellent resource for jigs and ideas to use with his router table.




