Program:

Fred Sandoval gave the program on Lutherie (the art of making string instruments).

Fred is a member of the club and made his own bandsaw and makes scrapers from crate strappings. The measurements are metric.

He showed a mold for a guitar and many other jigs and special tools he uses to create his master-pieces. He also showed how to file an angle on the top of the case so the top will have a curve.

He uses Sitka spruce and big leaf curly maple. He uses hot hyde glue to glue the parts together because it can be taken apart.

He said that the Mandolin is the hardest instrument to make.

The bows are as hard to make as the violins. He makes them out of Pernibucco and the legnth and weight are very precise. The string is Mongolian horse hair from the male horse only. It takes about 150 hairs to string a bow.

He finishes his instruments with an oil varnish, colored with special dyes. It takes 30 days to dry and must remain dust free the whole time. He uses no more than 4 coats.

Making a fine instrument is a tedious process and Fred doesn't cut any corners. Thank you for the fine program.

Doll House by Todd Burch

The scale is 1/6. If this were a full scale house, it would be about 352 square feet.

The approximate interior size is 44 inches wide, 16 inches deep. Two floors, each with 16 inch ceilings. Dollhouse stands about 49 inches tall.

Downstairs is Kitchen on the right and Dining/Living room on the left. A partial wall divides these rooms.

Upstairs is Bedroom on the right and and Dressing room on the left. A partial wall divides these rooms as well.

Front porch is the full width of the house with a hip roof covering it. Front vertical columns run from porch to hip roof.

The attic houses the electrical supply system. All lights and appliances work off 12 volts DC. Ceiling fan works off "D" cell. House plugs into wall and has regulated 12 voly supply in Attic. All light/fan switches are black and miniature rocker style.

The fully opened dimensions are about 80 inches. Height is about 49 inches.

OUTSIDE OF HOUSE:

- -) 3 Gable roof with cedar shake shingles. Copper Valleys. Front Peak.
- -) Front porch with light over front door. Switch is inside front door. Working Door bell beside front door.
- -) Left and right front porches. Stairs in the center leading up to working front door. Center front of house is fixed (Does not open). Stair treads and porch decking is laminated pine with "antique" finish.
- -) Left and right sides of the front, that include the porches, swing open and are hinges to the sides. The side are

also hinges to the back. The enables the front of the house to fold into the side of the house and has the effect of still being able to "play" on the porchs when the house is open. When front is closed, it can be latched with brass catches.

- -) Solid walnut raised panel front door with large upper window.

 Brass door handles. Walnut jamb and threshold with white trim.
- -) 5 windows on front of house. 4 on back. None on Sides. All windows but 1 are 4 light.
- -) On right side of house, on gable, it has an illuminated on/off rocker switch and also a keyed on/off switch that a grown-up can use to limit use of electrical.

INSIDE OF HOUSE:

- -) "Antiqued" Pine wood floors throughout.
- -) Paint throughout, yellow with white trim.
- -) Lace curtains in front windows.

 Gingham swag curtains on back windows.

ROOM CONTENTS:

BEDROOM:

- -) Working Ceiling Fan. Reversible.
- -) Bed, Pine 4 Post bed.

 Box spring, mattress and linens. Box spring is covered with muslin and has piping on the corners. Mattress is padded and also covered with matching muslin. White cotton fitted and flat sheets. Quilted bedspread.

 Pillow, pillow case, pillow sham. 3 round throw pillows.
- -) Window with gingham curtains.

- -) Ceiling Light with on/off switch on wall.
- -) Cedar Hope chest. Made of aromatic cedar. Finger joint construction with working lid. Lower moldings.

KITCHEN:


- -) Working Range. 4 round burners, each with an on/off switch, that get RED (no heat of course) when turned on. When any burner is on, stove top indicator light turns on. Stove top is an island in the kitchen.
- -) Refrigerator/Freezer with interior that lights when door is opened. Fridge plugs into the wall. Glossy white finish with with curved door handles. Three glass shelves.
- -) Pink Coral Corian(tm) kitchen sink with White counter top.
 Under sink there are copper pipes (P-trap and two supply lines)
 Sink is oval and the inside bevels inward as it goes down.
- -) Figured Maple and Pine Kitchen cabinets. Frame and panel construction.
- -) Window above sink with gingham curtains.
- -) Ceiling light with switch on wall.

DINING/LIVING ROOM:

- -) Solid Hard Maple dining table. Tapered Legs.
- -) Grandfather style "Tall" clock with working quartz movement. Pine. Upper and lower moldings.
- -) Ceiling light with switch on wall.

DRESSING ROOM:

-) Ceiling light with switch on wall.



- -) Desk with 2 drawers and lower cabinets. Corian Top.
- -) 4 Drawer Chest of Drawers. Top drawer is shallow, bottom drawer is deepest, with middle two drawers graduating the differences. Drawers are finger joint construction with plywood bottoms and false fronts. One brass knob on center of each drawer front. Figured Pine, shaker style.




