APRIL MEETING

Our guest speaker was Ken McBride, presenting a program on Drawer Construction. Ken went through all the steps necessary to build a drawer that will last through your lifetime and hopefully a piece that will be passed on through generations.

Ken recomends the book "Fine Woodworking

Ken recomends the book "Fine Woodworking Techniques 2, for everything you always wanted to know about drawer construction.

The best joint for drawer construction Dovetails-- hand cut or machine cut, even a poorly cut dovetail will last longer than any other joint.

Ken is a self taught woodworker. When he first began everything he read kept refering to the English Traditional Method of woodworking. There is a book that shows the traditional method, which is out in a soft cover reprint--The Complete Woodworker.

Kens work is in furniture repair and the first thing to go in a piece even an antique are the drawers. The first consideration when building drawers is the selection of the drawer face. The drawer face can become twisted sometimes as much as 3/4 of an inch. The sides of a drawer also take a lot of abuse.

Metal drawer guides are ok for the kitchen cabinets, but not for a nice piece of furniture.

While repairing furniture Ken has come across some interesting woodworking techniques that our Texas ancestors used to combat the swelling and shrinking of woods. One interesting technique is a spring loaded drawer guide.

Ken was stripping what he thought was a 3 drawer Red Oak Dresser, when the Red Oak came off. The dresser was actually Red Gum stenciled with a red oak finish.

The finished drawer should have good air ompression when closing the drawer, a smooth swish fit.

Ken showed us some samples of drawer construction used in different parts of the world.

Some examples are the NK Enco System which uses a drawer slip moulding applied to the bottom of the drawer sides. The French Drawer which is also a drawer slip moulding but glued to the drawer sides.

Ken has combined these two systems to come up with a drawer slip moulding made out of scrap wood that has an increased wear surface.

Sometimes a little detail will really enhance the finished product.

Most all old furniture was assembled with Hide Glue, alcohol will break up the polymers and the piece should come apart with a little pressure.

Ken always shoots for perfection but says he has never achieved it. I have a feeling that he has gotten as close to perfection as any one could.

We would like to thank Ken for the excellent program and for sharing his expertise with the members.

Bill Baker was looking for a Sears Parts List and Owners Manual for a 10" Table Saw made in 1972. He was interested in a Safety Blade Guard, if anybody had one for sale.

How do you Treat Green Walnut logs If you want to turn them green. One suggestion is to coat the ends with parafin, wait a week then you can turn the piece.

In Rafins videotape he suggests you turn the green piece to shape and size larger than the finished piece, while the piece is spinning rub with Beeswax--the piece will dry faster pecause of the size.

SHOW AND TELL

Chuck Maxwell is making a Santa Fe bench featured in the Woodworkers Journal. He showed us templates he used to make the mortis and tenon joints. He had a copy of a very old shoe shine box which he plans to make for the charity show.




