








Above: Marcus Brun showed the club his table saw sled that he made from 1/2 inch baltic birch plywood.

PROJECT OF THE MONTH --

SAW-TOP DUST COLLECTOR


Two of our favorite topics in the WOOD® magazine shop are dust collection and safety, and this nifty apparatus combines both. It works so well you'll never want to remove the blade guard again.


To make this handy attachment, cut a hole in the top of your existing blade guard (our guard is made of clear acrylic) and cut the hardboard adapter to fit. Seal the joint between the blade guard and the hardboard



adapter with a bead of silicone sealant. Then, connect the fittings to the blade guard as illustrated below. Cut the acrylic deflector to fit. Hold the deflector in place with silicone sealant or acrylic adhesive. Dust and chips thrown forward from the saw blade bounce off the deflector and get pulled into the flexible vacuum hose. Hang the hose directly above the blade and connect it to your shop vacuum or dust-collection system.



Below: This unusual type of box was made by our "box king", Lon Kelley. Notice the reversed wood slats. This box is somewhat unique and Lon did a great job on it!


Left: This is another one of Paul Koury's fabulous scrollsawn clocks. This one is made of an original kind of oak. Paul referred to it as "duck wood".

LIBRARY REPORT - MAY 2003 BY JOHN GAY

Did everyone like the woodworking show this year? I did. At the show we added two very good books to our fine collection. We bought *Shaping Wood* by *Lonnie Bird*. This book is well illustrated and almost 300 pages so if you have some designs that require some odd shapes, you need to check this book out. It's good. Also we have *Controlling Dust in the Workshop* by *Rick Peters*. Dust control is very important and we have some books on that subject but this one is very complete from a modest system to a more complex one. It covers just about everything from design to trouble shooting.

At our March meeting we had some nice donations. Bob Porter gave us some nice books on home improvement. They are Windows & Skylights and Adding On. Justin Kelly gave us several books on the scroll saw and some really good project books for the scroll saw.

I do have some sad news too. There are a lot of books that have been checked out for so long that they are just gone. This is part of the job that I don't like to do but I have tried to contact the names on the cards via Email, regular mail or phone calls but sometimes their names are not on our mailing list or their address has changed. Either way I did not get a response so we no longer have these books.

They are:

Biscuit Joiner Handbook, Jigs & Woodshop Furniture, Making Jigs & Fixtures, 250 Best Shop Tricks, Woodworkers Guide to Wood, Small Furniture, The Art of Making Elegant Wood Boxes, Joinery Basics, Understanding Wood Finishing, Setting Up Shop and Timber Frame Houses. That is a total of 11 books that are missing at a value of \$275.34 at the time when they were donated to the club. If we could replace them, it would cost more now.
