

# Field trip to Texas Kiln Products an education in mesquite.

pproximately 30 WWCH members made the trek to Smithville to learn about Texas Kiln Products. Ray Sheldon led the members through his operation and discussed the drying process. In addition to mesquite he told us about the outstanding quality of pecan he gets from that area along with cypress and pine.

In addition to milling and drying Texas hardwoods TKP also makes finished wood products to order. Ray showed the members a set of double doors his shop made in mesquite and discussed some of the problems in working with mesquite. There were also several beautiful mesquite mantles that his craftsmen had prepared for various woodworkers and home builders around the state. These mantles will be a distinctive feature in any home.

The drive to TKP is about 2 1/2 hours from Houston. Judging from the amount of wood members carried to their trucks and cars it seemed like an investment well worth the time. One of the bargains Ray offered to the members was a pickup bed full of his scrap millings for




\$20.00. Several members jumped on that opportunity.



## A source of inspiration and learning for woodworkers.

here's a playful quality to wood that most woodworkers I know find delightful. Wood can be fun to work with, and in turn, fun to play with. In years past wood was used to make toys, for example. And now, at the Houston Center for **Contemporary Craft**, there is an exhibit in town that many woodworkers will find... well, delightful. "Playing Around: Toys Designed by Artists" will be showing until June 6th. Whether you've made toys in the past or have enjoyed playing with them you will enjoy this show. It's playful, like the articulated armadillo above, it's fun like the carnival magician that saws the lady in half and it recalls childhood visits to the circus with a display of trapeze artists that twirl around in space.

Wood isn't the only medium the artists use. They employ metal, clay and fabric as well. There are fifty toys in all and they force us to remember a time when toys weren't made of plastic and when imagination was a key component. The show was curated by the Arkansas Arts Center in Little Rock from their extensive (over 3000) collection of handmade and historical toys.

And that's not all. There's also another show in the same gallery that features woodworking called: "Cabinets of Curiosity." Most of these objects are also made of wood. They are mostly a testament by artists to the furniture that's made to hold things: cabinets. In these cabinets, however, are found objects of an intensely personal nature. Objects and combinations of objects that are meaningful to the artist and are presented in hopes that the viewer might find a personal meaning. Most of these cabinets are made of wood using a variety of construction and finishing techniques.


While you're there check out the really fine retail shop that carries many handmade wood, fabric, pottery and jewelry items. In addition the Craft

Center has 8 studios that house several local craftspeople. Usually some of the artists are there and will take the time to talk and explain their techniques. They throw pottery, make jewelry and weave fabrics. Just like WWCH members, their "shops" show the process they use to make their crafts. The Crafts Center sponsors classes for adults and for children. Looking for a little inspiration in your own work? It may be here at the Houston Center for Contemporary Craft.

## **Design and Drawing in 3D**


n April's meeting, a question was raised about which CAD (computer assisted, or aided, drawing) programs people were using. I replied with what I use, a program called "Sketchup," but I figured I would write a little about it for those who might be interested, and show an example or two.


I've owned Sketchup for several months now, and could not be more pleased (well, I could be more pleased, but that's a longer article!!) I use it as both a design and layout tool, and as a sales tool for prospective clients. I have used several CAD programs (TurboCad & DesignCAD), and other illustration tools

(CorelDraw, PowerPoint) and Sketchup is by far the easiest to grasp and use.

With Sketchup, you won't get bogged down in technical terms that require weeks or months of training. In as little as a couple hours, you will be exploring your ideas efficiently and being productive. It is one of the few pieces of software that I have used that really harnesses the PC's intent of being easy to use and leverages the PC's power for graphics.

Here is a couple of drawings I did of a built-in entertainment center for a client. Having the ability to draw the item to scale, with as little or as much precision as needed, was a great asset in communicating my intent and understanding of what the client wanted.





## **Woodworking Is Therapy**

s an Occupational Therapist with Ben Taub Mental Health Services, I work with patients diagnosed with schizophrenia, psychosis, and mood disorders. The most popular daily group activity I offer is "arts and crafts". According to their level of function, this activity can be simple coloring to a multi-step pre-packaged wood project (i.e.sanding, gluing, nailing, painting & finishing). The purpose of this type of intervention is to assess thought organization and process, frustration tolerance, problem solving, & focus to task. During the groups, I discuss with the patients the value of an enjoyable leisure activity on stress management, sharpening cognitive skills, concentration, and the promotion of self-esteem.

The media selected by patients most often is wood. If I have a low functioning client, simply

sanding a small piece of wood, and decorating it with paint or a decal is a significant accomplishment, even if it takes many sessions. All completed projects are given to the clients upon discharge as a reminder of their ability to focus, follow instructions, and to reinforce the benefits of engaging in a pleasurable activity.

At this month's meeting, I will show you some examples of our client's woodwork. They are clearly not of the caliber of our accomplished members, but the end result—the feeling of pride, mastery of a skill, and positive outcome—is something we all share, regardless of our abilities and level of function.

# **April projects**




**Ridg Gilmer** showed his adjustable "short fence" for use on his Delta Unisaw. It's used for narrow pieces.










**Tom Makin** explained how this lidded box of white pine was an exercise in hand cut dove tail joints. He finished it with shellac and varnish.


