"Thou art my lute, by thee I sing, --My being is attuned to thee. Thou settest all my words a-wing, And meltest me to melody."



# **Show and Tell** Boxes from various woods. Made from poplar that Dave VanDewerker and Andy Toturi have been collecting from a local millworks shop and providing for club use. After expertly cutting the patterns, a sanding mop was employed to smooth the sharp edged and burnish the items. There is no finish application employed as these may be painted by the recipients upon presentation and for later presentations.

## **Show and Tell**

First is a dining table with two benches. (only one bench shown.) African Mahogany, the table top was from a double trunk tree, so the center split also has bark. I cut part of the outside live edge where it stuck out too far, and at an angle to resemble the existing edge, then stained it all to match. With the gap in the middle, it acted like two separate tops. I beefed up the apron, all 1.25" thick x3.5" tall, and extra cross bars too. Kerf mounted steel corner brackets and hanger bolts hold the apron to the legs, pocket screws hold the cross bars, and table top clips in grooves hold down the top. 73.5" x 40", 30" tall The benches are 15" x 60" x18" tall, also with extra large aprons at 1.25" x 3". All finished with tung oil to bring out the grain and darken the color, allowed to dry, then HVLP sprayed on water borne urethane, which worked great on these large surfaces.

The second project was for Sugarland, who requested six little library boxes. Really just basic carpentry, I call them oversized bird houses! These are of 3/4" exterior grade plywood, with lots of pocket screws and glue, stainless steel hinges and latch, one middle shelf, and 4 triangles of 4x4 below to surround the expected 4x4 post to which they will be attached. Acrylic panel just held in with brads, is translucent in the photos, because of the film to be removed later. These are unfinished as they will be painted by six different artists. I had to hunt to find some solar lights that are not crap. These have a brighter light, bigger collector, and much bigger, better battery. I discarded the lower parts, drilled a hole for the LED filament bulb, and attached with caulk so it can be removed later if the battery needs to be changed. — **David Janowitz**
