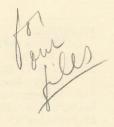

SELLING WOODWORK AT CRAFT SHOWS

This is the first of a series of articles on selling at craft shows that we hope to present in the next few newsletters. These articles are written by Herb Wilbourn, who has had considerable experience with craft shows. We hope that some of you will find this information useful.

Some of us are professional woodworkers, or semi-professionals who have an established outlet for their products. Some do woodwork for others on a salary basis. Some do woodwork solely for the fun of it and don't try to sell anything. Some are woodcraft hobbyists who like to sell enough of their products to pay for their hobby. I am in this latter group, and offer others in this group some of what I have learned about selling at craft shows.

There are numerous craft shows of various types in and around Houston and over the state, all year long. The problem is, which of these shows suits the purpose of the wood crafter best?

There are two categories, the juried shows and non-juried shows. I will go into the juried shows later. First, let's discuss

the run-of-the-mill craft shows. There are two principal types of non-juried shows, the CIVIC shows and the commercial shows. Civic shows are sponsored by towns, chambers of commerce, fraternities, etc. Commercial shows are sponsored by professional promoters. Some are juried and some are not.

The civic shows and some of the commercial shows can be entered by merely paying the required fee and agreeing to the rules of the sponsor, which are usually very simple.

Civic shows are held outdoors in the open, under tents or shelters, or indoors in malls and auditoriums. The woodworker should seek out the indoor shows where possible. A blistering sun, or a sudden rain shower can be catastrophic with fine wood products. Gusty winds often make a shamble of a tent or outdoor cover, so try to get indoors. Usually the fee for an indoor booth is higher than outdoor, but it's worth it.

Fees for civic type shows are usually lower than commercial shows, and will vary from \$15.00 to \$60.00 per space. The average space, or booth, is 8 feet by 10 feet. Some are larger, some smaller. Civic shows rarely charge a commission on sales, but sometimes ask for a donation for their auction sale.

The exhibitor is responsible for his display equipment at all shows. This means you will need a table and other display equipment to show off your wares. At some shows a table is furnished in the fee. Some offer tables for rent. Electricity is sometimes offered at additional cost.

There are one day, two day, and three day shows. Some two and three day shows

furnish security at night, some don't.

Recommendations to those who want to enter a craft show for the first time are: 1. Get a sales tax certificate from the State Comptroller. (There are local branches in Houston). You MUST collect sales taxes and pay them to the state treasurer. Find a one day sale near your home if possible, with a moderate booth fee and booth size to accomodate your wares. 3. plenty of change. 4. Try several shows. If you don't make it the first time, try again. Eventually you might hit the jackpot.

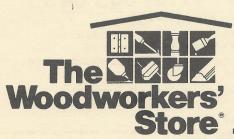
