


input to take the club where the members want it to go. I thank you all for letting me continue in club leadership and urge you all to participate.

Mr. James K. (Ken) Wallis 1927-2005

Ken Wallis, recipient of a Lifetime Achievement Award and long time member of the Woodworkers Club of Houston was laid to rest in Nacogdoches recently. The service at the Fredonia Hill Baptist Church was well attended. Ken had been working with wood since 1944. He served our country in the U.S. Navy. Ken was a devoted church member and sang with the choir. He retired from Southwestern Bell Telephone after 37 years. Wilma his wife of over sixty years survives him. A son and daughter make up his immediate family. Ken was a remarkable man, one who spoke his mind, faithfully. His greatest joy other than making things from wood was giving them away. For many years his work was the centerpiece of a charity event that raised hundreds of dollars. He gave willingly of his time and talent

Ken had a wry sense of humor. I remember his saying at Show and Tell that the Franklin Glue people had not recommended Tightbond for gluing Coriam. He showed a segmented turned bowl that he had glued together using tightbond in 1951; He said, "Guess no one told the glue." Ken was a co-founder of the East Texas Woodworkers group, and faithfully attended our meeting until the Doctor limited his travel. The minister spoke of Ken's talent, highlighting his bowls and his love of God. He remarked that you and I complain more about the temperature than Ken ever complained about anything. One of his last comments to me was that "there are many-many people less fortunate than I". Godspeed, Ken Wallis.

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
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

A heart of padouk for his wife, says **Eddy Arnold**. The stand is of maple—both pieces were sculpted and finished with spar varnish followed by French polish.






This cutting board of walnut and maple was glued up by *Jim Robertson*. Jim stated that the walnut soaked up the Titebond 3.



Fred is holding the jig used to make the mortises.




Lon Kelley turned these bowls of mesquite that were gathered from cut trees at Houston County Lake, Crockett, Texas.

Rich Thomas explains how "easy" it is to build Stickley style chairs of white oak. The dark caps are of walnut.



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

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
