SAFETY By Zatis Murphy

Among the benefits of being a member of our club, the one I have enjoyed the most is that of learning new woodworking tips and techniques from other members. With safety, we can learn from each other, too.

My years as a research chemist have led ne to develop a high level of safety awareness. But it was not always that way. Very little attention was given to safety during my ten years of college. Most of my safety education came after I went to work in th oil industry. Indeed, the potential hazards found in chemical laboratories, manufacturing plants and such, are great. Unsafe practices sometimes are unforgiving; a person may not survive an accident to have a second chance to do it more safely. Therefore, much planning is done to reduce the potential hazards BEFORE any work is started. Even then, accidents occur.

We woodworkers should plan our work carefully, too. If you are like I am, occasionally you've had a "near miss." You've done something that you might have thought was safe, but in the process, something wa overlooked and you almost had a disaster. One of our meetings I told you about one such near miss I had while trying to cut the top off an oval-shaped stamp holder with a Bandsaw. I tried to hold the piece by hand and the blade grabbed the wood, yanking it out of my hand. The result was a severly bent blade and a damaged project. Fortunately, I was not hurt. I rethought what I was doing and resorted to holding future pieces with hand screws.

Have you had a near miss? Tell us about it. I welcome any contributions you might have for this column. Discussion of near misses and solutions to the problems is one way of helping us all avoid similar pitfalls in the furture.






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
