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MAY MEETING

Our Speaker was Charles E. Pace, a woodworker who makes authenic Windsor Chairs. His skills extend beyond chair making to smithing, tool fabrication and antique restoration. Charles' talk was extremely interesting and well received. Our thanks to Charles for an excellent presentation.

Windsor chairs originates in England around 1700 near Windsor Castle. They were made in Britain and America from 1730 to 1830, when Hitchcock chairs replaced them. Hitchcock chairs could be shipped knocked down, saving freight and were easier to build. As a result, Windsor chair making techniques were all but lost.

Windsor chairs have a one piece pine seat, red or white oak bents and maple turnings. Pace uses a custom made steam box and jig for bending the arms. Pine seats are light weight, slightly resilent and easily carved. Maple turnings are strong, oak bends easily when steamed.

He uses a treadle lathe to produce the turnings. The lathe is an original design, adapted from antique lathes. Charles used a complete program to optimize the drive system ratios. Moving parts have brass bushings.

Pace uses hand tools to carve the seats, beginning with an adz, then scorp, compas plane, travisher, devil and various spokeshaves. Pace designed and built, many of his tools, based on antiques.

He uses a draw knife in a shave horse to reduce stock prior to turning. The shave horse is a unique design based on the same principles as the Windsor Chair.

The treadle lathe has 3 speeds or torques. Pace grinds his lathe tools to accomodate the low speed of a foot treadle lathe. He can turn legs in 1 1/2 to 3 minutes.

The chair is assembled from parts made on a semi-production basis. Round tenons are fitted into round mortises made with a spoon bit. The 78 holes require an 1 1/2 hr. to be drilled and

the chair assembled.

When bending the arms, the oak is steamed for 2 minutes. Liquid fabric softener added to the water has reduced breakage from 25% to 5%.

Pace paints his chairs with a modern version of the milk paint originally used. The chairs must be painted because the 3 different woods would take stain unevenly. The paint is mixed out of lime, nonfat powered milk, and rit clothes dyes. Ten dollars of materials is sufficient to paint two large rooms floor to ceiling!

WOODWORKING TIPS

Drying Tips--STICKERING

It is very important to sticker a lumber stack to insure proper drying. The stickering of the lumber is essential in kiln drying as well as air drying. The type of stickering material is edually important. The stickering material should be kill dried so as to prevent staining. Klin dried lumber is processed in such a way as to prevent mildew from presenting itself. Stickers should be of similar material to the wood being dried, i. e. When drying Red Oak the stickers should be a hardwood material. in placing the stickers 18"--24" apart to minimize risk of cupping and bowing. (the closer the better) To help prevent checking, place a sticker flush to the end of each board. This will be no quarantee but this will reduce your chances of checking.

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
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
