MAY PROGRAM

Our program for May was on abrasives, presented by Kevin Hayes and Brad Wilson of Norton Abrasives. Kevin and Brad passed out two brochures: How to select the right sandpaper and True Grit sanding tips from the world's abrasives leader. Each and every member that attended the meeting received a Norton Paint and Varnish Stripping Pad made of Bear-Tex Nylon Abrasive. Since everyone received a brochure that details what sandpaper is: the different abrasive grains, grits, abrasive bonds, abrasive backings, open-coat vs. closed-coat, the brochure also oes into smoothing drywall compound or laster, refinishing painted or varnished doors and woodwork, refinishing cabinets made of soft woods and refinishing metal furniture, even has tips for using and storing sandpaper, I suggest you read the brochures.

The butt joint on sanding belts are the strongest—the joint is butted together and fastened with mylar tape, a butt joint can be run in either direction as opposed to a lap joint which is glued under pressure and this type of belt can only be run in one direction.

Is there a shelf life for belts? Yes about one year, but alot depends on how and where that belt is stored. Because of high humidity and high heat in our shops it would be best to store

your sanding belts inside your house.
We would like to thank Kevin Hayes and Brad Wilson for an informative program on sandpaper and for the Bear-Tex Nylon Abrasive Pad that we all received and for the Norton Jacket that they donated to our club raffle. Thanks again fellas.

Chuck Maxwell showed us some new jigs that he made: one for making dovetails on a table saw, a very simple jig for making dados with a router and also a depth gauge,

John DeBender showed us a Mahogany Plant stand that he made from Walnut.

Lewis Vallette turned a bowl consisting of 84 pieces made up of Cherry, Mahogany, and Oak, and two bowls of 88 pieces each. Lewis also made some fixtures for his lathe, he salvaged some hex stock from the junk yard and made face plates for his lathe--Lewis also made the lathe from salvaged and new items.

Bill Smith made an Amish Man and Woman in rocking chairs from salvaged pallet material.

Guy Meaders made a Barristers Bookcase from plans in Woodsmith and finished it with Bartlevs'.

Jimmie Harp showed one of the three tables that he has made from Long Leaf Yellow Pine salvaged from a grain mill in Beaumont. To make the top Jimmie ripped up 2 x 8 's then glued up three panels to make the top--to accomplish this the joints must be perfect.

Ken Wallis showed a variety of turned bowls made up of Bubinga with lots of sapwood, Corian and wood, which he glued up using yellow carpenters glue and its still holding together and a bowl made up of Bubinga and Maple. All finished in Bartley's.

Bill Hochmuth had a music box made out of old Cherry and Walnut. Bill demonstrated the 72 note movement.

Larry Barnes made a pencil marking gauge out of brass.

Anything with a drawer or drawers. From tiny drawers to large items, anything goes.

SAFETY-----THE LATHE By Zatis Murphy

Dress properly---long sleeves must either be buttoned or rolled up above the elbow.

Always use sharp tools, with a dull tool you

will likely force the tool.

Use the right speed---The bigger the piece

the slower the speed.

Cut the corners off a square piece before placing on the lathe except for small items like pens and pencils.

Stand to one side when starting the lathe to make sure the piece will not fly off of the lathe.

When face plate turning, if you use paper as a seperator let the glue dry over night.

Do not force a tool when cutting on a face

plate it can go flying across the room.

Long spindles should be supported in the center, you can purchase a roller support or you can make one yourself. Long spindle turning can create harmonic whip.

Use a tool rest appropriate for the piece you

are turning.

Unplug machine to change various set ups. Switches can fail sometimes in the on position.

Safety switches the type where the center pulls out for safety, can collect dust and moisture.

You should always wear safety glasses and

a full face shield.

Stand comfortably, keep the floor clean of debris.

Pay attention to what you are doing.

Remove all of your jewelry before working in the shop.

Remove the tool rest before sanding.

When applying finish or polish do not have any loose strings or pieces these can be wrapped around the piece or your fingers.

No gloves--some turners use skin tight golf gloves when sanding. The heat from sanding can bring up blisters.






