You hear some one say quite often, "My old saw is not doing good. When I can I am going to buy me a new one." In many cases if the person would take some time to clean, replace or repair, and adjust his old saw he will probably end up happy. The old saw would be just as good and in some cases better that a new one.

Over the last few months I have been working on a chair variation of my Natural Tension benches. This is a commission for a spinner that I have discussed previously. The frustration is not with the actual design but with my inability to set aside enough time to finalize the design in wood.

Over time if someone were to ask me to describe myself the range of what I've done for a living and interests that I have had would take a considerable amount of time. However, once I found woodworking it has become a constant thread. Ten years ago I used my sculptural skills to build a scale model of a salt body in the Gulf of Mexico for a seismic study. Back when I was more into target shooting and shotgunning. I refinished and rebuilt a few stocks. Now that I have found weaving as an art form, I am encompassing my woodworking skills. At this stage I am having a difficult time saying that I use the woodwork to do weaving or visa-verse. The combination is really becoming the challenge.

In the end, each of us has our own fulfillment that we get from the woodwork. Krenov stresses this in his philosophy. It is not just the final piece that is important but the journey in the work of creating that piece.

For now, I am having a difficult time getting enough time together to have a woodworking journey. I have been sidetracked into my past profession. I am finding less interest and fulfillment there. I am a woodworker. I will be back to the bench very soon because that is where I get fulfillment that spans a long time.

Squirrel away in your brain proportions, dimensions, material selection, methods of joinery and finish, and a knowledge of the tools that were used in building these things. 




