OCTOBER PROGRAM

We had a very interesting program presented by Fred Sandoval, Instrument Maker.

Fred played flamingo guitar since childhood and after visiting a museum he decided to make his own. He studied various books and a lot of trial an error, he found out that most of the books are not very complete or in error.

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Fred is also making a Mandolin, Viola, and various other instruments. On most of the instruments he must first build the form or forms, he also has built some of the tools needed to construct the various steps to complete an instrument.

For the actual shape of the instrument you can purchase instrument pattern books. He has found that the best material for templates is "for sale and garage sale sign material" available at the hardware store.

To transfer a pattern to the wood you place the pattern on the wood and prick through leaving a series of dots on the wood. DO NOT HURRY! Always do half of the pattern then flip it and do the other half.

To thin down the wood he uses an overhead pin router.

Most of the tools Fred uses are instrument maker tools, he says that he uses one chisel to do 95% of the carving. He has planes as small as about 1/2" x 1" which he uses against the grain, U-bolts for clamping the sides to the mold. One of the finest clamps that he uses are large rubber bands.

He uses a special instrument glue because sound travels 6 times faster through wood

The precision that it takes just to make the molds is very precise.

Fred presented a very entertaining and informative program. Fred has also promised to bring the finished instruments to the meeting. Thanks Fred for sharing your expertise with us all.

*Blades make a difference on table saw noise many saw manufacturers are making their

blades much quieter than in the past.

Stuffing cotton balls in your ears will not work. Use foam or rubber plugs or hearing muffs designed for hearing protection. Check the Noise Reduction rating on the package.

Even if you have some hearing loss you can protect the remainder of your hearing by using some type of protection. Find what you like best and what is comfortable to you, this way if its comfortable you will use it.

Remember that sound levels double every 3

decibels.

SHOW AND TELL

Ken Wallis had quite a variety of bowls that he turned. He showed us a 8/4 maple turned bowl with 8 coats of Bartleys, a lidded maple bowl, Stave bowls of Walnut and one of Bubinga. For his stave bowls he first cuts 22 1/2 Degree cuts on the table saw and then does the final fit using a Disc sander on the bevels for that perfect fit.

Ken uses mostly Bartieys Gel Varnish, but reccomends buying only the size you will need to complete the job as it does not have a long

shelf life after it has been opened.

Another member made a black and white tile topped chest board top laid over particle board with black lacquered finish legs.

BANDSAW BLADE FIELD TRIP

On Saturday Oct. 23 we had a field trip to Falcon-Auger at 4401 S. Pinemont, Suite 200.

Mike and Donna answered a slew of questions regarding the bandsaw blades and bandsaws. Jason welded up a 1 1/2 inch metal cutting blade, smoothed down the weld using a 1" hand belt sander, using a Dremel style hand grinder cleaned the weld from the teeth and filed the band edge by hand, by doing this process by hand you can check the annealing.

When they finish with a blade, the teeth match and the backs are smooth. One of the Members brought a brand new blade that he had just purchased, Donna was so amased that at the weld there were two teeth instead of one that they recut the blade and rewelded so that there was only one tooth at the weld instead of two. Mike also took a look at our blades and told us what caused them to break. Mike looked at Chucks blade and told him that he had a bad tire on his bandsaw, Chuck said that was right because he had just purchsed a new tire on Friday to replace his bad tire. We all got our broken blades rewelded and learned alot about bandsaw blades.

The blades that they sell are industrial quality (made from a heavier blade stock than those you will find at the hardware stores.)

They also quarantee their welds--if you have one break and its still sharp, return it and

they will reweld at no charge.

They also have special pricing for the Woodworkers Club of Houston members besure to tell them you are a member when you call to order blades.

We would like to Thank them for their generousity in hosting this field trip and fixing out broken blades.


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
