SEPTEMBER MEETING

Our host for the September meeting was Austin Hardwoods and we would like to thank

them for their hospitality.

Scott Casey with Austin Hardwoods told us about the type of woods that they carry-many different exotics, turning blanks, 95 varieties of wood, some tools and they had some Walnut stumps they hope to turn into rifle blanks, they also have an in house mill shop.

Austin Hardwoods is now a Bartley's paste

varnish dealer.

The program was on Glue and Glue Applications presented by Dr. Bill Forkner. Should you use dowels or not--Dr. says that the holding quality of the glues available today makes it a waste of time to use dowels. After 20-30 minutes the wood will break before the glue joint falls.

The Biscuit machines that compressed Beech Biscuit (not the Hungry Jack variety Biscuit) swells from the moisture in the glue and makes a very solld joint. If you can't justify a Biscult machine, a T-slot cutter with a shop made jig can also be used to make the

slot for the compressed Beech Biscuit.

The two most popular glues are the white and yellow glue, the main difference is set up time, with the yellow glue setting up much faster than the white glue. The yellow glue will set up in 20-30 minutes, then you can remove the clamps. Elmer's also making a yellow style glue with a little brown color for dark woods.

SQUEEZE OUT--

1.) After the glue sets up but before it turns to stone take a sharp chisel and remove the squeeze out.

2.) Do not use a wet rag to remove glue, the glue will penerate the wood fibers and the wood will not accept a stain.

HEAT SET GLUES -- Are mostly used on veneers. Dr. recommends you keep one Iron for shop

use only as its very hard to remove the excess glue from the iron.

Some heat set applications:

Veneer tape for plywood edges.
 Sheets of glue for veneers.

Always keep pressure on the cool side while applying heat of the cool side will blister--if it does blister just reheat.

CONTACT CEMENT

Water clean up cements can be used in an

enclosed area.

Lacquer clean up cements must be used in a well ventilated open space with fans---besure to extinguish pilot lights.

EPOXY-- was developed for engines--super hold-you have to place a coating on both sides--not very good for an invisible joint in wood.

HIDE GLUE-- once was the main glue of all woodworkers but today it is mainly used by furniture restores. Hide glue joints can be disasembled if necessary at a later date. Hide glue can be purchased in liquid form or powered form, the power flake must be reliquified by heating in a double boller--warning just don't let the pot run dry or you'll stink up

Hide glue is also used on musical instruments because they have to be disassembled from

time to time.

SUPER GLUE

Super glue is too expensive for large projects but great for woodturning.

GLUE TIPS:

TABLE TOPS-- When gluing up, reverse the annual growth rings--as each board warps a little, the top will remain reasonably flat because wood is always moving.

DRAWERS-- If you make drawers in a humid shop they will never stick.

FRAME AND PANEL--The panel should float--if you must glue--glue only a tiny spot in the middle of the panel. If you glued the entire panel it would be unable to float as the frame swells and shrinks and the panel would split.

ROLL TOP SLATS--Yellow or white glue is better than contact cement, because they are more pliable.

HEAT RESISTANCE--Yellow glue has more heat resistance than white.

LATHE SANDING -- When sanding keep your project cool or the glue will bead up and out of the joints.

STAINS--Oak can turn black when the glue touches a clamp, because of the tannin in the

Jimmie Harp made a wooden wagon with a staked bed, turned wooden wheels. Curved tongue made up of 1/8" thick strips soaked in the bath tub, then they were allowed to dry in a mold, then glued together. He finished is project in spar varnish.


