SAFETY-----Planer or Surfacer

First Read the instruction Manual--expecially when you first set up that new planer or any tool--and do not throw away that manual you will need it in the future.

1. When surfacing long stock get someone to help at the other end or place a roller at the

'out" end of the planer.

2. Before planing a warped board, true one

face on the jointer.

3. Try to determine the grain direction of each piece and feed with the grain.

4. Measure the thickness of the stock and adjust the machine to remove about 1/16" to

1/8".

5. Turn on the power and allow the planer to come to full speed. To avoid injury from kickback, stand to one side, never directly behind the stock. Feed the stock into the infeed rolls and, as soon as it takes hold, remove your hands from the stock. Never let your fingers get under the edges.

6. If the wood starts into the machine slightly crooked, a tap on the edge will straighten it. if the stock sticks, lower the bed

immediately and turn off the machine.

7. If large amounts of stock must be removed, always take some off both faces. If this is not done, the board will tend to cup because it has slightly more moisture toward

the center than it does at the outside.

8. When stock has been glued up to make a larger surface, it is impossible to true or face it on a jointer. To do it on the planer, first remove all the glue from the surface. Then adjust the machine to a slow feed and a light cut. Place the best face on the bed of the planer and true one side. Then reverse the stock, readjust for thichness and plane.

Ted Kurland saw a contemporary bench in a Museum that he liked. From this idea he designed a bench that would be sturdy enough for his kids to climb on and still look elegant. He used through tenons with wedges and front dovetailed tenons, he also did the upholstery. Made out of Cherry with a urethane finish.

Jimmie Harp made a sewing table out of long leaf yellow pine that he got out of that 100 year old grain mill. Finished with Bartley's gel

paste varnish.]

JULY PROGRAM

Our guest speaker was Susan Neptune of Susan Neptune Heritage Restorations at 319

Maione in Houston.

Susan began her talk on the new water based finishes that we will all have to use in the future. Her business is in restoration and preservation. Since water based finishes are just now being used commercially she finds no antiques with a water based finish to restore.

One of big problems she sees with water based finishes is durability over the years. The stripper for Water based lacquers is isopropal alcohol which is not good for longevity. But water based finishes are non-carcinogenic and do not destroy the

ozone.

Shellacs will etch with alcohol but you can retrieve the finish but water based will crinkle

Susan finds that most woodworkers place all their effort into the making of the piece and not in the finishing. They hurry the finish along, which can make or break a piece.

She suggests that we use Waxes as waxes will not ruin the piece and also protects it. Susan says that there are three wax types: American, English and French.

American wax is a hard wax with lots o.

carnuba and little beeswax. Not the best.

English wax--like Jacpole Antique wax is very hard but works fast. It is applied in a circular motion and finished with the grain.

French wax is very high in beeswax, it is easy to apply and to buff.

Beeswax can be grated on a cheese grater. diluted in Turpentine, is real lush but does not work well in this climate.

Brie wax contains acetone in it--do not put it on a Shellac finish--you will etch the Shellac.

Susan does not reccomend wax on the dining room table top.

Bartley's is a good finish that can repaired without stripping. Susan wants a finish that she can get in and out of.

Shelf life on finishes vary--Lacquers have an indefinite shelf life, Shellac's must be used by the date listed on the can or they will not dry. Bartley's does not have a long shelf life so buy just the amount that you can use in a short time.

How to choose a finish--rule of thumb keep simple stupid.

1. Pure Tung Oil --- no additives -- is good for

Kitchens.

2. Lacquers are designed for spraying. All finishes can be controlled for shine by introducing more stearate(when dry looks like talcum powder).

3. Synthetic lacquers--DEFT-can be brushed, you can also add analine dyes and food colors.

4. Waxes

Cherry--answer is shading.

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
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


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
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
