#### NOVEMBER MEETING

Kerry Kale sales representative of Makita Makita's new demonstrated 12" compound saw, which tilts a full 60 degree in compound saw, which tilts a full 60 degree in both right and left positions. It will make a full crosscut on a 2 x 12 and 45 degree bevel cut on a 4 x 6 and 2 x 8. The saw comes complete with a 96 tooth carbide blade and sells between \$849.00 to \$999.00.

Kerry also explained about their new cordless drill systems. These industrial tools will be available with a meter on the battery. The meter will tell you how much charge you

The meter will tell you how much charge you have remaining and also how much life is maining in the battery.

You should first condition a new battery--if you run the battery down for the first five times before recharging-the battery will not develop a memory. You can also leave the battery in the charger when not in use. Batteries will lose a little charge everyday just sitting around your shop. Heat also causes a battery to lose its charge. Batteries will hold their charge longer if stored in the refrigerator.

Makita will be moving there current service center and warehouse the second week in December to the Executive Park in Stafford.

Kerry was going to bring with him the Makita van full of tools but was unable as the van was in Colorado the weekend of the meeting.

Zatis Murphy showed us a Mahogany Hallway Mirror with brass hooks, finished in Minwax and Tung Oil. A quilt rack made out of solid Cherry stained with an analine dye and topcoated with Bartley's.

Bob Carter made a quilt rack out of #3 common pine, with a wheat pattern carved on the end pieces. Bob finished with a dark Walnut

stain and topcoated with lacquer.

#### FEATURE PROJECT FOR DECEMBER

Flat items--cutting boards, trays, trivets, puzzles and picture frames.

#### SHOW AND TELL

Bill Hochmuth made a music box out of Tuara finished with red analine mahogany dye and topcoated with 10 coats of lacquer.

Lewis Vallette custom made a jig to turn perfectly round balls on his custom made lathe. With this jig and lathe combination he can turn a

10 to 11 inch ball.

Fred Sandoval showed off some of his Queen Ann and Chippendale reproductions that he has made. One was a chest with five drawers and a Handkerchief drop leaf table that he made

using only handtools.

Mike Turner showed us how he made a very sturdy workbench. Mike made the legs so that they would fold making the bench portable. He also made all of the vises for the bench. He covered the top with formica, so any glue squeeze out could be cleaned off easily. Mike said that he only spent about \$40.00 in material and hardware for his bench.






