#### MAY MEETING

The scheduled speaker failed to show up or even bother to call to say that he could not make it. So an impromptu program was put into action--Bud went into an open forum on Good Machines and what would you recommend as your chose of tools.

One member wanted to know what type of lathe would be best, it was suggested that a variable type of lathe would be the best like the Delta Electronic Lathe.

Another member asked about speed controls for routers, first check to see if your router has a universal and not an induction motor. If you intend to do a lot of routing at a slow speed it would be best to buy a variable speed router, but for limited use one of these speed controls will work.

What is the best type of table saw to buy? Some members recommend the Delta Contractors or Unisaw, either one would be a good choice—but all members agree that the most important thing on any table saw is a good fence. When you buy a Delta saw you can save some money by purchasing a Unifence at the same time. If you already have a table saw you can up grade it with a variety of different brands of very efficent fences: The Unifence, Beismeyer, Excaliber, etc. We have a lot of members that own these brands and they can tell you more about that particular type of fence.

If you have a saw that you would like to improve the performance of ---check what type of pulley and drive belt that is on your current saw. If you have cast pulleys get a turned steel pulley and a segmented belt the type sold by Inline Industries. This will cure most of the vibrations on your table saw.

#### SAFETY By Zatis Murphy

#### RADIAL ARM SAW

When cutting on the radial arm saw besure to hold or clamp the wood against the fence. Keep your fingers out of the path of the saw cut. Besure that blade is sharp, the bearings and tracks are in good condition and you have good extension tables.

You can rip on a radial saw but it is not a very safe procedure.

#### POWER MITER SAW

Most the same safety procedures apply to using a Power miter saw, keep those fingers out of the path of the blade, make sure the blade is sharp, watch out for those small pieces do not get your fingers too close to the blade. Keep those safety guards in good working order.

Always use normal safety devices--safety

glasses and ear protection.

When purchasing a saw blade remember that there are blades made for the table saw, blades made for the radial arm saw and blades made for the power miter saws.

#### PROBLEMS AND SOLUTIONS

Steve Pinn has had various problems with the Grizzley Bandsaw, he has replaced the guides with Carter ball bearing guides and has found that using bandsaw blades made by Suffolk Machinery of N. Y. to be very good. Suffolk also reminds all users of their blades to

be careful not to over tension blades.

Another member wanted to know what was the best Biscuit machines to purchase. Thats a hard question because there are so many good biscuit machines on the market that you have to decide what features you would use the most and compare that with the cost. Again the members themselves are a very good source, you can ask their opinion and also try their biscuit machine.

#### MAY FEATURE PROJECT JIGS AND TOOLS YOU HAVE MADE

Chuck Maxwell showed us a couple of router circle cutters, one small and one very large for cutting rockers.

He also had a jig that he uses on his table saw for zero clearance when cutting laminate.

Chuck also brought along his jig for cutting various size circles on his bandsaw. If you ever have to cut circles this is the best jig around and is very easy to make, Chuck also had copies of the plans.

Bill Baker showed us a jig for cutting a straight edge on a board with no straight edges.

He also made a jig for cutting grooves to

make a CD storage box.

Walt Turpening made a mortising jig to fit his Excaliber table saw fence.

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
