Since I have retired I have added a new Delta Scroll saw and a 14" B&D bandsaw to my workshop, as well as a 4" jointer. I recently made a homemade 1" belt sander using an old washing machine motor and a skate board wheels. This wass added to a Mark II Shopsmith, the normal amount of small power tools, and a collection of hand tools made over the past 40 years. MAY MEETING


