#### **Problems & Solutions:**

We have a correction to last months problems and solutions.

What is the best way to apply Deft to the outside of a ceder chest?

Use a sprayer. Cut it for HVLP sprayer or spray it straight from the can with a high pressure sprayer. Do not spray the inside. This is backwards. Cut it for a high pressure sprayer. Spray it straight from the can with a HVLP sprayer. Thank you Bill for pointing this out to me.

When turning bottle stoppers on a 3/8" dowel rod, how do you keep from breaking the dowel?

Solution 1 is to turn up the speed.

Solution 2 is to make your blank a little longer and use the tailstock to steady the wood. Then carefully face the end off after removing the center.

What is the best bandsaw for general work and resawing.

A Delta or Jet 14" with a riser for resawing. Use Falcon-Auger blades for the best performance.

#### Program:

Tom Kennedy gave the program on Varnishing Wood. Tom is a graduate chemical engineer from Cornel University and has been woodworking from 1948. He did a program for us last year on glues and was kind enough to return and do todays program.

Tom handed out a comprehensive outline of his program. It started with preparing for the new finish and went step by step on how to strip the old finish and prepare the wood for a new finish.

Then he told us how to varnish the surface, including varnish formulas, sheens, preparation of varnish, brushes, working conditions and applications.

The next section was problems and tips. He explained how to solve the silicon problem and the oily wood problem. He told how to seal the stain

**Shop Safety:** 

Fred Jacobson reached behind the blade on his tablesaw to hold the piece down as he fed it through (he saw this on a video tape). It kicked back and he nicked his thumb on the blade. You should always use a push stick.

When routing a sign, using a 3/8" router bit, the bit came loose and the cut ended up too deep. It was recommended to check bits, especially when taking heavy cuts, to make sure they are tight. Make sure that they are not bottomed out in the collet. Buy a new collet because they will wear out.

#### Show & Tell:

John Hanna brought one of his intarsia works called "Feathered Friends" from a pattern by Judy Gale Roberts. It was made from 4 shades of Western red ceder and white wood with a 1/4" plywood backer. It had 118 pieces cut out with a bandsaw and a scroll saw. It took about 1 1/2 weeks to make.

Bill Baker brought a round button box. It had 18 drawers and was mounted on a turntable. It was made from red oak and the curved drawer fronts were made from white pine with an iron on veneer. He also brought the jig he made to make the drawers.


Chuck Maxwell brought an oval table made from plans in "Woodworkers Journal" Vol. 20 No. 1. (Jan.-Feb. 1996). He also showed his device for creating the ellipse to form the table top. He said he also got a book called "401 Tech Tips that shows an alternative method of drawing an oval. (Don Richardson has a computer program for making ovals that he will share with you) Chuck also showed some building blocks that Don Sloan made for his children in 1947. He and Don are planning to make some for the kids in Texas Childrens and Shriners Hospitals.

David Cobb brought a ceder chest he made using a Liegh Jig for the dovetails and a 15" belt sander. It had spiral legs that he made using a program that Walt Terpening gave him. It had brass hinges and was ready to finish.

Don Sloan made a lamp made from plans from "Wood" magazine, April 1997, Issue No. 96. He said that he followed the plans to the letter but when he went to buy the Minwax Salem Maple stain he found out that there was no such thing. He used what he thought was the closest to it and is waiting for a reply from "Wood" about their error.

Mike Turner brought two bow saws, one out of

maple and one out of walnut. He explained how he makes them without buying a kit and he has a source for the blades if you are interested.

before varnishing and how to preserve left over varnish. We learned how to apply a wax coat, how to varnish over lacquer and why to keep freshly varnished pieces out of direct sunlight for about a month.

Tom then went on to tell us how to make and use a restorer to restore the finish on old pieces. The last item was how to use polyurethane varnish.

This was a great program. Tom not only donated his time, but also donated two of his reference books, "Fundamentals of Paint, Varnish, and Lacquer Technology", and "Furniture Restoration", to the library. We owe him a great big thank you, and hopefully we will have him back again.

If you missed the meeting there are extra copies of his outline in the library.

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
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
