Shaper Power- The problem is the burning while using some bigger bits. It is noted that shaper may not have enough power since it is very important to not take too much wood on each cutter's pass.

Kiln Drying- for lumber cut from local logs

Joining Wood (The workshop companion), by Nick Engler, Rodale Press, Inc. 1992, 124 p.
